


Message from the **2021 Church Council President**

Dear Holy Trinity Family,

Here we are after another year of Covid-19 challenging our health and our faith. Yes, we are impatient to get back to "normal" as we protect ourselves from infection during meetings and services, but our Ministry is flourishing, in spite of, or because of, this challenge. There are many instances in the Bible where God dealt with the impatience of His people – we are no different. We all yearn for more in person contact with each other, singing at services, not wearing masks. It WILL come; Praise the Lord!

We have continued to grow worshipers thanks to our on-line Sunday services, our multiple offerings for: Morning Devotions, Prayers for all People, Faith Formation, Sunday Lift, Faith 5, Book Club, Mid-Week Study, Story Time with Miss Rachel, Music Offerings, Coffee and Conversation, Luther & Lager, Hike & Seek, Family Promise, Links, Women's and Men's Bible Studies, Robinson CLC, DLM Food and Resources and all their partners, and Arts @ Holy Trinity.



Major improvements and repairs have been made to our beautiful building while we have been away. Repairs to the organ, upgrade the sound system, roof, widows, exterior lighting, security, Park Street face of the Sanctuary, fellowship hall ceiling, new computers installed; work on improving the electrical capacity and A/C for DLM and the offices in the education wing, re-surfacing the Park Street parking lot are in the works.

This year we have sought grants to help fund DLM and Arts @ Holy Trinity. To date, thanks to the efforts of Cam Turner, Darlene and Stefan, Ruth, and Pastor, we have received grants totaling, (with more in process):

DLM = Oasis, \$15,000; ELCA Hunger Grant, \$24,000 (over 3 years); Personal Gift, \$15,000

Arts@HolyTrinity = Ohio Arts Council, \$2,000; Corporate Sponsors, \$8,000

In 2022, we will be launching a new initiative through the Renaissance Committee. The "Invite-Welcome-Connect Initiative Mission" has core values that are "Intentional, Relational, and Accountable" including key concepts: Invite-Evangelism, Welcome-Hospitality, and Connect-Belonging. The purpose of this mission is to offer strategies in building up the congregation. Council has committed our congregation/community of faith to implement and actively support this initiative through the guidance of the Renaissance Committee and our Cabinet. Be on the look-out for opportunities to eagerly participate in this initiative!

Thank you for allowing me the honor to serve as President of Church Council this year.

Message from the Senior Pastor


"...for it is God who is at work in you, enable you both to will and to work for his good pleasure."

Dear friends in Christ,

The words above (Philippians 2:13) are ones not often read. They come immediately after the marvelous and often-heard hymn for which this chapter is deservedly more famous: "Let the same mind be in you which is in Christ Jesus..." Paul writes these words to a congregation which he deeply loves, in spite of their propensity for internal discord. And he reminds them of the great humility of Christ which leads to the cross, but also to the resurrection that is the foundation for their own hope and joy.

Then, at the conclusion of that hymn, Paul challenges/invites/encourages the Philippians to "work out" their own salvation...not in the sense of manufacturing for themselves what Christ has already accomplished, but to reckon it. To

understand it. To make the meaning of that salvation alive every day. And they should do this because "it is God who is at work in you..."



The ministry of the Church is one important place...shared among us...where those questions are answered. We meet God in the transcendent holiness of worship, in the beauty of art and music, in the faces of our neighbors in need, in the words of Holy Scripture that we study. Faith Formation Ministry

The Faith Formation team's efforts through 2021 have been centered around supporting Rachel Nũnez and other staffled Faith Formation activities both "virtually" (over Zoom and Facebook) and in-person as seemed prudent based shifting circumstances with COVID-19 throughout the year. We are always grateful for the leadership gifts of Rachel Nũnez, but that has been especially apparent this year as virtually all of our programming has been staff-led, due to COVID-19 circumstances.

A variety of Zoom and Facebook-based opportunities for faith formation, fellowship, connection and support that began in 2020 were continued all throughout 2021, which included:

- Scheduled LIFT (Living in Faith Together) activities, including activities after service on certain Sundays as well as a new "Hike and Seek" on some Saturday mornings (led by Rachel Nũnez)
- Daily Devotionals on Facebook Monday Friday (led by Pastor David Nevergall, Rachel N

- Mid-Week Faith Formation in person/on Zoom (various topics throughout the year, including Jesus: The God Who Knows Your Name (Max Lucado), Lenten study of Matthew, Blessed to Follow: The Beattitudes as a Compass for Discipleship (Martha E Stortz including a session with the author over Zoom!), Living Lutheran articles, Baptized, We Live: A Congregational Guide to Lutheranism as a Way of Life (Daniel Erlander), Taking Faith Home worksheets, and Waiting for the Shepherd (Advent Study)) (Rachel Nũnez and Pastor David Nevergall)
- Luther and Lager Hour on Zoom led by Pastor David Nevergall (Monday/Thursday evenings)
- Scheduled Bedtime Story and Prayer with Ms. Rachel (Rachel Nũnez) on Facebook as well as some in-person home visits in the Fall

Additionally, materials for Faith Formation at home were provided to families for Epiphany, Lent/Easter, Fall, and Advent/Christmas, and service projects were available for God's Work, Our Hands Sunday in September. Starting in the Fall, Rachel Nũnez and Pastor Nevergall began Tuesday and Wednesday morning "Coffee and Conversation" times at local Panera Bread locations - please stop in to say hello!

Women's Bible study and Holy Trinity Book Club continued to meet throughout 2021, both in person and over Zoom, as needed.

Finally, Faith Formation team hosted a reception in November for the newest confirmands - Abbigail Mormino, Luke Nagle, and Camdynn Stevens - warmest congratulations and best wishes to each of them.

Outreach & Social Concerns Ministry

Responsibilities of the Outreach/Social Concerns Team included distributing benevolences generated by the TLC Endowment Fund, coordinating volunteers for Family Promise and Habitat for Humanity, delivering canned soups and stews donated by the congregation to OPEN M, and providing funds for congregational participation in missions and projects that serve others.

Over \$18,000 in Benevolences were used to support many events at Robinson Community Learning Center and for the Robinson Family Resource Center, South Street Ministries, OPEN M, and the MLK Laundry Day. The team also provided support of the Lutheran Summer Music program at Valparaiso University, and the DLM food pantry.

Due to the pandemic Trinity did not host any Family Promise families in our church building, nor did we participate in any house-building for Summit County Habitat for Humanity.

Support provided to Robinson CLC in 2021





DLM Food & Resources continued to prepare and deliver food boxes twice each month to families involved with Project Rise and to others throughout the community. Each food box always contains fresh produce, dairy products, meat, and a wide variety of non-perishable food items.

When the pandemic hit in March 2020, DLM quickly adapted its processes and began delivering food boxes, the only food pantry to do so in Summit County ... and continues to be throughout the past year. Deliveries were expanded in 2021 to also include delivery of personal care kits, infant care kits that included diapers and wipes as well as needed laundry and household supplies.

DLM continues to increase its partnerships with local businesses, agencies and organizations in order to best meet the needs of families. In 2021 new partnerships included: Street Outreach Services (SOS) Program, The Highlands Pregnancy Center, OASIS Outreach Opportunity, MKC Diaper Bank, Vantage Aging, Oak Street Health and Molina Health Care.

DLM is coordinated by Darlene Katz, whose position changed to DLM Director in 2021, and by Stefan Katz, DLM Operations Manager. In addition, OhioGuidestone provided a paid staff person throughout most of the year and additional staff support was provided by Project Rise.

Volunteers from Holy Trinity, Faith Lutheran Church, Hudson High School, IBH Addiction Recovery as well as Project Rise and OhioGuidestone served each month at DLM.

For the first time, DLM hosted an online fundraising event on Giving Day, November 30. As a result, more than \$47,000 was raised. DLM also received a three-year \$24,000 ELCA Hunger Grant to be paid \$10,000 in 2022, \$8,000 in 2023 and \$6,000 in 2024.

Below and on the next page are statistical recaps for 2021: more than 60,000 pounds of food were distributed to 7,368 individuals (2,042 households) during the year. The peak distribution was during the first quarter.

Food Pantry - Summary of Families Served




Pounds of Food Distribution - 2017-2021

Personnel Ministry

There are different kinds of gifts, but the same Spirit. There are different kinds of service, but the same Lord. There are different kinds of working, but the same God works all of them in all men. Now to each one the manifestation of the Spirit is given for the common good.

~ 1 Corinthians 12: 4-7

Under the Constitution and Bylaws of Holy Trinity Lutheran Church, the Personnel Team is responsible for developing personnel practices for staff, developing and implementing plans for administering those practices, recommending all rates of pay and other benefits for employees, and considering how volunteers can be involved in the mission and ministry of the church. The Personnel Team also conducts reviews of the Personnel Practices Guide, staff salaries and/or rates of pay, and any employment contracts that might be in effect. As an ongoing part of these duties, the Personnel Team interprets the contents of the Personnel Practices Guide and monitors compliance with its provisions. The Personnel Team collaborates with all other ministry teams, reviewing requests and recommendations for employment and forwarding its recommendations to the Congregation Council for consideration. All decisions on staff employment rest with Council.

With the ongoing restrictions imposed by COVID-19 on social gatherings, Holy Trinity Lutheran Church continued to minister to its members and the community by utilizing alternative approaches in its effort "to bring Jesus to people, through love and the word of God." Holy Trinity staff, including called members, employees, and volunteers, <u>use</u>d a variety of approaches, which often involved virtual meetings with computers, cell phones, and other electronic devices, rather than in-person group sessions at the church. Awkward at first, this approach became the norm, and is still in use as the pandemic refuses to abate.

Staff Notes:

- During 2021, some former staff positions continued to be vacant, including the Director of Mission Development (former Director of Congregational Ministries) and various youth positions. Some staff continued to be furloughed (Sextons and Nursery Attendants), with one Sexton leaving to take another job.
- The role of the Financial Secretary continues to evolve, now assuming greater responsibilities in the management of invested funds. Revised hours and compensation for this position were approved by the Finance Team and Council.
- The DLM Food and Resources program has seen tremendous growth during 2021. The DLM Coordinator position was changed to become the DLM Director, and a new DLM Operations Manager position was added. Stefan Katz has been employed in this capacity. His expertise and creative talents in helping to set up processes for the storage and distribution of food and household resources have been instrumental in the success and growth of DLM this past year.
- Volunteers at Holy Trinity have spent many hours providing ongoing service to maintain our facilities, assist with worship,
 complement the music program, and provide the manpower for community ministries:
 - The DLM food program and many events serving Robinson School have provided ongoing hours of volunteer service in the community;
 - Special thanks are given to those musicians who share their vocal and instrumental talents to enhance worship;
 - Also, Holy Trinity would like to commend Bob Foutty for generously volunteering his time and leadership in helping
 to develop our media ministry and online web productions. With Bob moving out of state, his talents behind the scenes
 will be missed.
- Pastor Nevergall and his staff maintain their online presence through worship, bible studies, devotions, and prayer.

The Personnel Team continues to act as a resource to the Congregation Council, ministry teams, and staff. The Personnel Practices Guides serves as a reference for issues that impact Holy Trinity staff, which include paid employees, rostered staff (serving under a call through the Northeastern Ohio Synod), and non-paid volunteers.

Members of Holy Trinity Lutheran Church who are interested in helping to support staff are encouraged to serve on the Personnel Team as it works to carry out its duties under the Constitution and Bylaws.

Property Ministry

- 1. Broken and missing slate roofing tile were replaced and /or repaired.
- 2. Replaced the two large flood lights focused on front of church's (east) elevation. Existing lights haven't worked and were beyond repair.
- 3. Repair and replace missing and damaged fire rated ceiling in Fellowship Hall. Ceiling rating has been compromised in the past when work was done above the ceiling. Because of the plasters age there were small areas throughout that needed repaired also. A two-hour ceiling rating was originally designed and is required.
- 4. New vinyl coated fencing between alley and playground has been installed.
- 5. Office computer equipment replaced, and new software installed.
- 6. Camera and security system improved and working. We are checking on a maintenance agreement.
- 7. Phase one. We had major water leaking on south side wall of church. Leak involved five stained glass windows, brick and stone trims. Work has been completed on Phase One.
- 8. We contracted a second phase. Phase Two has started. Project involves same work repairing windows and masonry, stone and brick on the balance of south elevation including stair well and elevator exterior. Phase Two was started and Frost completed 30% before weather shut the work down for 2021 season.
- 9. Three replacements windows were ordered for the first-floor music room. The existing six windows couldn't be repaired and no longer operated but remaining three units are functioning as fixed windows. Operating windows were requested to provide fresh air ventilation to the music room. Windows due for February install.
- 10. Greg Frost Proposal dated July 2020 was approved by Council. Proposal was for 1954 addition parking lot side, the alley side and the playground sides of the building. Masonry repair includes top floor lintel exposure and flashing, three individual lintel replacement and pointing and caulking. This work is now scheduled for 2022 building season. We put this work on hold with covid in 2020. In 2021, Phase one, two, above, pushed this work to 2022 building season.

Meditation and Memorial Garden

The Meditation and Memorial Garden Committee convened on June 10, 2021, to assess immediate needs of the Memorial Garden and align on future vision and next steps. Additional Meetings were held in July, August, October and December where the following needs were identified:

- A plan for regular maintenance
- Fountain cleaning and preservation
- Assessment of assets
- Outline of administrative responsibilities: (ordering of plaques, calligrapher, collection of fees and paperwork)
- Sourcing a Liaison from HTLC Property Team
- Update fee schedule

Actions and Next Steps:

- Regular maintenance needs have been identified, and the committee is exploring options for the work.
- Fountain was cleaned, and rust was identified. The committee is obtaining quotes for Powder coating of the fountain and four benches.
- An asset consolidation plan for the Memorial Garden was presented by Jim Minisall and the committee voted to approve the plan.
- Administrative responsibilities have been outlined and documented.
- Don Parsisson agreed to serve as Liaison for Property Team.
- The committee voted to increase the fee schedule to \$2000 to include the plaque effective January 1, 2022
- Re-envisioning of the lower-level grass area.
- Exploring Bibb line access.
- A request was made to Council to recognize the Memorial Garden as an official committee in the constitution (resolution was passed at the October 2021 Council Meeting).

Welcome Ministry

"Welcome one another, therefore, as Christ has welcomed you, for the glory of God." Romans 15:7

Our purpose is to provide a welcoming atmosphere at Holy Trinity for both our members and our visitors. 2021 presented continued challenges as Holy Trinity fully reopened its doors and incorporated hybrid worship as a regular part of services. We further extended this hybrid style to congregational meetings, outdoor worship in the summer, funerals, and all Arts @ Holy Trinity Concerts.

After the initial purchase and installation of equipment in 2020, 2021 saw further expansion to "fine tune" and add additional camera angles, capabilities, and work flow. One side of the rear balcony has been successfully converted into a production "nest" to allow the live stream operators a line of site with the Nave floor. We also installed 2 new mics above the choir to improve audio pick up for the live stream, and installed a new, fully digital soundboard to allow for additional flexibility and expansion during services and concerts. 2021 also saw an expansion of capability to allow remote operation of the live stream equipment.

The Welcome Team would like to thank Ann Lawson, Lorin Sickafoose, and Alex DeLuca for serving as live stream operators at various times during 2021, and to Lesli Eisenhart for serving as our Technology Usher during our various online events. At present, we are still in need of additional volunteers to learn the live stream system in order to cover vacations, illness, holidays, etc., and to serve as Technology Ushers. Please contact Bob Foutty if you are able to serve in this manner.

In 2022, Welcome Team will undergo a change in leadership as Bob & Jess Foutty have relocated to Orlando, Florida.

The Welcome budget includes funds for promotional items, advertising, software, new-member events, evangelism, miscellaneous communications materials, and live streaming software and subscriptions.

Worship & Music Ministry

The Worship and Music Team continued to meet throughout this past year to collaborate on ideas to enhance your worship experience as we continue to live stream the weekly service at 9:30 am. We "broadcast live" on Facebook, we live-stream on our website, and have a YouTube Channel with 150 subscribers to date. Weather permitting, we were able to meet outdoors this past summer on the front lawn for two Sundays and enjoyed the percussion circle and special music provided.

We continue to utilize this online format for worship, concerts, and weekly study events. Our outreach has grown exponentially. We have many weekly viewers from other states, as well as Europe and other countries. Our weekly average online attendance hovers at 500+ and an increase in online giving from those viewers was also greatly appreciated. We can truly continue to live our mission statement.

We also advised several other teams on matters of sound and lighting improvements in the sanctuary as we continue to enhance our broadcast experience.

Music served an integral part in our worship at Holy Trinity. A mixed quartet carried the majority load of singing on behalf of the congregation through the Spring term. We were delighted to expand that leadership after Labor Day. Seven to ten singers served weekly on a rotating basis. Following pandemic protocols set forth by our parish leaders, all musicians remained masked and physically distanced. Trinity Bell Choir returned in full force and gained two new ringers for a total of eleven participants. Our drum circle continued to meet and lead in worship periodically, enhancing both indoor and outdoor services. Other instrumentalists shared their gifts in meaningful ways, taking extra precautions to help keep us safe.

We firmly established Arts @ Holy Trinity as a recognized and respected venue/presenter for world-acclaimed artists in ways that set Holy Trinity apart from ticketed-commercial events throughout the Midwest. We strengthened essential ties with universities and colleges as outreach, educational and service-provider institutions. Our concert series proceeded online through the Spring term and in person in the Fall. Award-winning and award-nominated artists brought inspiring music to our community and offered outreach opportunities to area students. Our online presence continues to add hundreds of additional audience members with each presentation. Bob & Jessica Foutty worked tirelessly to see that viewers experienced quality sound as well as close-up views of presenters and beautiful sights from our sanctuary. We are grateful for the many underwriters and donors who generously contributed to this 37th season, and those who contributed to our 38th season which began in September. He also explained that we are expecting over \$50,000 in grants for DLM and Arts @ Holy Trinity. Expenditures for Personnel is projected at \$464,000. Our tithe to the Synod is 10%. The total Mission Investment Draft is \$1,221,699. Bob stated that this is a challenge, but quite doable.

Valerie thanked everyone for participating in the meeting and for their willingness to serve in the important mission of HTLC. She also thanked the outgoing Council Members for their service: Marsha Asente, Lesli Eisenhart, and Ann Lawson.

Pastor David led us in a closing Prayer.
