On Thursday, November 21, 2024, the Church Councils of Faith Lutheran Church, Fairlawn and Holy Trinity Lutheran Church, Akron, along with a few additional congregational leaders who had been part of the Project Isaiah 43 gatherings, met together at the NEOS office in Cuyahoga Falls.

Those who attended from Holy Trinity were: Mike Aemling (Call Committee & Council), Amanda Archbold (Call Committee), Diane Chambers (Council), Val Clark (Council), Frederica Cohen (Council), Lesli Eisenhart (Council), Amy Indorf (Council), Rachel Nunez (Staff), Velma Pomrenke, Jacquie Wert (Call Committee), and Pastor Becki Verbridge.

The meeting was facilitated by Pastor Jonathan Stufft, Assistant to the Bishop for Congregational Vitality & Director for Evangelical Mission. He led the group through a guided conversation that included: reviewing the collaborative activities held to date, ascertaining how further collaboration might strengthen/expand each congregation's ministries going forward, identifying "non-negotiables," and discerning "next steps" in the collaboration process.

Pastor Jonathan compiled the input gathered at the meeting and sent it to Pastor Becki and Pastor Jean Hansen. They will meet at the beginning of January to review the input and devise a plan for gaining input from additional congregation members through "listening sessions." These "listening sessions" would be held over the course of one or two weeks at each church in February, with members signing up to participate either in-person or via a zoom group. The size of the groups would likely be limited to 8-15 people. Two congregational leaders would be assigned to each group, with one leader guiding the discussion focusing on key questions, and the other leader recording the responses. The hope is that the input from the listening sessions would be compiled before the beginning of March.

Once that information has been collected, the Pastors along with the Church Councils, will determine if/how to move forward with the collaboration.

The purpose of the collaboration discussion is how the two congregations might work together to support and strengthen the ministries of each in their existing locations. †

Task Force Appointed to Evaluate Second Floor Area for Congregational Use

At the recommendation of the Congregational Care & Connection Team, the Church Council has appointed a Task Force to investigate and make a recommendation for renovation/updates of second floor area. This would include: the Welcome Center, Staff Offices, Chapel Lounge, Library, Men's & Women's Restrooms, Room 202, and the adjacent hallways. These are the areas currently used by the congregation for small groups and larger gatherings. Together, the persons listed below represent all areas of Holy Trinity's ministry. They will begin meeting in January, under the leadership of Bruce Mansour, with the expectation that they will formulate a recommendation in the first half of 2025.

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Organ Repair Work to Begin

Have you noticed low vibrational sounds like an idling truck or an air compressor running in the sanctuary? This became especially noticeable during worship on Sunday, December 22 and audibly affected the stability of the sound coming from the rear organ including the horizontal trumpets.

We have been raising money through the Sponsor-a-Pipe program for this repair to the air pressure system for a couple years. It has only recently become audibly disturbing, but has been a known issue for some time. As the vibration continues, it shakes the wind supply to the rear pipes and only gets worse as the stabilizing mechanism gets looser and looser.


We have raised enough money so far to just cover this repair which has been scheduled for the end of January with Leek Organ Company, who currently maintains and tunes our legacy organ. Scaffolding will be set up in the balcony so that the air reservoirs can be removed and taken to the factory for rebuilding. For now and into February, both sides of the rear antiphonal organ will be disconnected and unplayable, leaving the top keyboard of the console completely silent.

The cost approved for the Leek repair was \$28,358. The scaffolding is estimated to be an additional \$10,000-\$13,500 (dependent on a variety of factors). The project is expected to begin Monday, January 20, and should be completed within three weeks.

Eventually this work needs to be continued into the main organ to keep it stable and useable for the coming years. Hopefully it doesn't become an emergency as the back organ has. Your continued support of Sponsor-a-Pipe is much needed and appreciated. †

Back in late March 2024, when I received the startling invitation from the Commission overseeing the Vatican Jubilee 2025 festivities to come and represent all those around tehe world with disabilities and special needs with a special performance at St. Peter's Square on Tuesday, April 29,2025, I was thrilled to say the least! So it was with a mix of joy, fear, and faith that I responded back to the Holy See with "Yes! We will come!"

- Joy How could we possibly turn down the opportunity for our Hearts for Musicians to represent what is often an under-served, under-represented population, especially in the music world? What elevation of self-esteem my beloved Orchestra kiddos and adults would stand to gain! What joy for these Hearts for Music musicians to know that they are a "light on a hill" for all those with similar disabilities and dreams of performance on a big world stage!
- Fear—We are a small, poor non-profit, and the expenses of transporting Hearts for Music musicians, ALL of whom are medicallty fragile were astronomical to say the least. Among the many fears were things like: How were we going to rasie at least \$120,000 with less that a year to prepare? Where was I going to find people and volunteers to help not just raise the money and awareness of our Rome performance, but assist with logistics of getting disabled children and adults safely in a flying metal tube halfway across the world and then back again?
- Faith—Every challenge and pursuit of any dream must start with a single step of faith and trust. The fear did kick in, but then I remembers the three Magi. These three holy wise men received the interior call from God to travel from three different lands to bring treasures of gold, frankincense, and myrrh for a little baby in a smelly far-away cave. There was no social media warning that might be fake news. There was no GPS, no cell phone, no map other than the stars. They did not question how they would make the great distance, what dangers they might encounter or if they have enough water or food. They just went, They simply obeyed that gentle call from God and headed out with child-like faith and trust. Inspired by these three Magi, I too decided to ask



Not long ago, I received a phone call from a dear friend. It was unusual because I normally don't get phone calls from them. Every now and then I'll get a text or Facebook message of season's greetings, or a more general message of love and support. But this morning they called, all the way from Arizona, just to say hello and send some love. I was so surprised and caught off guard that my instinct was to worry – I almost asked if everything was okay – I kept waiting for the reason they had called. The reason was simply me; they called just to let me know that they were thinking of me – that they loved me. It really meant a lot to get that phone call that day.

In the midst of this busy season, when folks have all the reasons in the world to savor their spare time for themselves, those closest to them, and their most pressing needs, here were a few minutes offered for me. That simple, short, phone call served as a reminder that I am loved, that my presence matters to someone in this world beyond the usual suspects of immediate family and neighbors and colleagues I see week-to-week.

I was reminded in that moment that even when I am not thinking about it or focused on it, even when I don't expect it – it's there – the kind of love that catches you off guard, that shows up when you least expect it, that doesn't expect anything in return, that offers reassurance and goodness for the journey that is life. That kind of love, offered that day, gave me hope and renewed my spirit.

Years ago, God showed up unexpectedly as a babe in a manger to offer a little reminder of hope and love for our world. And the equivalents of heavenly phone calls were sent – messengers brought startling, but good, news of great joy to an unwed, Palestinian soon-to-be-mother, to her unsuspecting soon-to-be-father, to shepherds abiding in fields, as well as wandering seekers of wisdom and light.

The message came: unto you is born...Christ, the Lord, Emmanuel – "God With Us". Unto YOU. The message was simply you. You matter. You are beloved. God loves you. God loves you enough to enter into this world – to come to you with a love that is startling and surprising, that is there for you whether you are looking for it or not, that holds you in all that you are, forever and ever and ever, offering reassurance and goodness towards your renewal. How great a love is that!

The message from God is YOU. And the message of Christmas is LOVE. †

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What New Year Resolutions Should We Make?

The practice of making New Year's resolutions goes back over 3,000 years to the ancient Babylonians. There is just something about the start of a new year that gives us the feeling of a fresh start and a new beginning. In reality, there is no difference between December 31 and January 1. Nothing mystical occurs at midnight. The Bible does not speak for or against the concept of New Year's resolutions. However, if a Christian determines to make a New Year's resolution, what kind of resolution should he or she make?

Common New Year's resolutions are commitments to quit smoking, to stop drinking, to manage money more wisely, and to spend more time with family. By far, the most common New Year's resolution is to lose weight, in conjunction with exercising more and eating more healthily. These are all good goals to set. However, 1 Timothy 4:8 instructs us to keep exercise in perspective: "For physical training is of some value, but godliness has value for all things, holding promise for both the present life and the life to come." The vast majority of New Year's resolutions, even among Christians, are in relation to physical things. This should not be.

Many Christians make New Year's resolutions to pray more, to read the Bible every day, and to attend church more regularly. These are fantastic goals! However, these New Year's resolutions fail just as often as the non-spiritual resolutions, because there is no power in a New Year's resolution. Resolving to start or stop doing a certain activity has no value unless you have the proper motivation for stopping or starting that activity. For example, why do you want to read the Bible every day? Is it to honor God and grow spiritually, or is it because you have just heard that it is a good thing to do? Why do you want to lose weight? Is it to honor God with your body, or is it for vanity, to honor yourself?

Philippians 4:13 tells us, "I can do everything through Him who gives me strength." John 15:5 declares, "I am the vine; you are the branches. If a man remains in me and I in him, he will bear much fruit; apart from me you can do nothing." If God is the center of your New Year's resolution, it has chance for success, depending on your commitment to it. If it is God's will for something to be fulfilled, He will enable you to fulfill it. If a resolution is not God-honoring and/or is not in agreement with God's Word, we will not receive God's help in fulfilling the resolution.

So, what sort of New Year's resolution should we make? Here are some suggestions:

- Pray to the Lord for wisdom (James 1:5) regarding what resolutions, if any, He would have you make.
- Pray for wisdom as to how to fulfill the goals God gives you.
- Rely on God's strength to help you.
- Find an accountability partner who will help you and encourage you.
- Don't become discouraged with occasional failures; instead, allow them to motivate you further.
- Don't become proud or vain, but give God the glory.

Psalm 37:5-6 says, "Commit your way to the LORD; trust in him and he will do this: He will make your righteousness shine like the dawn, the justice of your cause like the noonday sun." †

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
