Beginning this summer, Holy Trinity will once again be an internship site for the ELCA as we welcome Debbie Pinnegar as our new vicar. By way of introduction, Debbie sent along the article below. We're looking ahead to a Sunday soon when she and her husband can join us for a face-to-face introduction. More details are yet to be worked out...so look for more information in future Highlights!

My name is Debbie Pinnegar. I am happy to be coming to Holy Trinity for my two year internship this summer. I am a student at Trinity Lutheran Seminary. I currently live in Columbus while on campus at the seminary. I have been very involved in the Spanish for Ministry program, Addictions Awareness Group and the seminary's Green Faith Initiative. While at Trinity Seminary I have done contextual ministry with the congregation of Gethsemane Lutheran Church on the north side of Columbus.

Last summer I did Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE) at Trinity Community and Patriot Ridge



Community, both multi-tier residential care communities for seniors in the area around Dayton, OH. This gave me the opportunity to learn pastoral care in a community context with longer term relationships with community members than one might experience in a more traditional hospital environment. I believe that this experience at these two retirement communities has helped me to prepare for caring relationships in a congregational environment.

I am originally from Goshen, Indiana. I attended Anderson University in Anderson, Indiana, for my undergraduate. I majored in Christian Ministries and minored in music business. After college I returned to Goshen and worked in churches in Christian education and youth and family ministry for ten years. I worked in United Methodist churches, a Disciples of Christ church, and an ELCA church. I married my husband, Brian, in 2007. At that time the recession hit our area of the country especially hard. The religious bookstore that I managed cut their hours and the churches in the area could no longer afford additional staff. After a couple of temporary positions, I became the manager of a Comfort Inn. I managed the hotel for eight and a half years, before coming to seminary.

I have felt called to ministry in the church for as long as I can remember, but a call to be a pastor came when I was in high school. At that time I had never met a

Falling Off the Cliff by Pastor David Nevergall



I love Wylie Coyote...can I just admit that here? Yes, I know. There's too much violence in those cartoons for our enlightened sensibilities... but consider: He is steadfast in his mission, possessed with enviable durability, and profoundly unable to learn from his mistakes. It's a combination of characteristics that has kept me chuckling since I was a kid. (Want to see some of these antics? Go to YouTube, and search "coyote falls looney tunes.")

Does it ever seem to you that the Church is a lot like Wylie Coyote? Steadfast. Dedicated. Durable. Unrelenting. But all too often, not very adept at figuring out that, no matter what latest and greatest device you buy from Acme Church Supply, there's always an oncoming truck or falling rock.

Case in point: the church wants to be more culturally relevant in order to speak the Gospel message to a post-enlightenment culture. Good idea. But the church buys into the cultural norms of a consumerist society in order to pull that off. Bad idea. Why? Because things like sacrifice and obedience and humility don't play very well in a chest-bumping, fist-pumping, satisfy-me-now kind of world. Enlightened self-interest may fill arenas for good music and a hip message, but it is stubbornly resistant to the change of heart that is at the root of the Christian life. The result: a shallow faith that offers little in the way of sturdy Christian identity and is even less able to discern what the priorities of the Christian experience might be.

By the way: ignoring the need for cultural relevance is an equally bad decision. Hoping for a return to the good ol' days is a nice exercise in nostalgia, but a lousy strategy for mission.

So...what do we do? How do we keep from getting blown up by bombs of our own making?

I wish I knew for sure what the lock-down, sure-fire answer was. But I have an idea that it is deeply linked to the way in which we form communities that nurture Christian experience...something that our traditional methodologies seem to struggle to do effectively. This is a topic we've been working at for a while and will continue to work at. The questions are tough ones: What does it mean to make disciples? Is weekly attendance at worship a reliable gauge of involvement when more and more folks have other options for Sunday morning? What does growing engagement with the mission work of the church tell us about how people get hooked up to Christ? And what does it really means to be in community? All of these questions need answers, but they seem to point in one direction: the Church is most faithful and effective when it simply insists on being the Church, i.e. following Jesus into the world to live in trust and hope.

It's funny when Wylie Coyote gets run over by the results of his own poor judgment. But (for me, at least) it's painful when it happens to the church you love. And while it won't be easy to alter something so firmly established as what it looks like to be church, it is well worth the effort. Christ has shown us that we can trust God to bring new life out of death. Again and again, when the church has fallen off the cliff, it's been right into the embrace of the Savior. So we too can have the courage to ask tough questions and dig for good answers, trusting that God's got us right where God needs us...here doing Jesus' work at the corner of Park and Prospect. †



History Notes

Sixty years ago this month – specifically April 7, 1958 – members of Holy Trinity Lutheran Church were prouder than proud that a former pastor of theirs was featured on the cover of Time Magazine – perhaps the premiere news magazine of the era. The article, titled "The New Lutheran," began with this vignette:


"Well," said Satan. "What's new with the Protestants?"

"You Mean in America, don't you, sir?" answered the Demon for the Democracies.
"Of course, I mean America," snapped

Satan. "We've put a lot of work into the churches and I'm not at all sure it's paying off ... who's Mr. Protestant these days?"

"There isn't exactly a Mr. Protestant, sir. But there's Franklin Clark Fry."
"A nice name," said Satan. "Where is he?"

Members of Holy Trinity in 1958 knew exactly where Franklin Clark Fry had been from 1929 to 1944 ... right here with them in Akron, Ohio. Then in 1944, with mixed feelings of sadness and pride, the congregation gave him up to be president (now called Bishop) of the United Lutheran Church in America (ULCA) now merged into the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. During his tenure as president, Dr. Fry became a significant force for Lutheran is through the Lutheran



president, Dr. Fry became a significant force for Lutheranism through the Lutheran World Federation as well as for ecumenism through the World Council of Churches. At his funeral service ten years later in New York City, Dr. Robert Stackel, then pastor at Holy Trinity, said of Dr. Fry, "... the ecumenical colossus of the age ... his intellect was awesome ... double acrostic puzzle mastery without missing a word spoken at a meeting." His was a powerful personality with a hearty laugh, a man of deep emotion who shepherded the congregation through World War II and had deep compassion for the disadvantaged.

Yes, Satan, it was a nice name. Don't ask where he is. You might not want to tangle with Holy Trinity's own Mr. Protestant. †







Documentary: Disturbing the Peace

Christ the Redeemer Lutheran Church, 9201 Brecksville Road, is hosting two screenings of the award-winning documentary, "Disturbing the Peace." Both screenings will be followed with a Q&A with the film's producers. The showings will be Monday, April 23 at 7 p.m. and Tuesday, April 24 at 1:30 p.m. in the church's fellowship hall.

"Disturbing the Peace" is about people born into conflict, sworn to be enemies, who challenged their fate. The film follows everyday people who took extraordinary actions by standing for what they believe in, just like those who came before them ... Martin Luther King, Jr., Rosa Parks, Gandhi, Nelson Mandela and many others. The movie challenges all of us—to understand the narrative we line within, to look at our current roles in our societies, and to decide what role we are going to play in creating a more humane world, for all. And it starts with our willingness to disturb the peace. †

What is an Orff instrument?

Holy Trinity was blessed to acquire a set of Orff instruments from recently-closed Lutheran Church of the Good Shepherd in the greater Cleveland area. A number of our members and friends play these in worship services and weekly LINKS music classes.

Just what is an Orff instrument and what is the Orff Schulwerk approach? The West Music Company, a manufacturer of such instruments, offers this succinct response:
Orff refers to a specific approach to music education developed by Carl Orff during the 1920's, which combines music, speech, movement, and drama into musical lessons that

are very similar to the way a child plays naturally. The term "Schulwerk" is German for "school work". Most of the time, when someone says "Orff" they are referring to the Orff Schulwerk approach to music education. The fundamental principle of the Orff approach is the idea that children can learn music the same way they learn language. Orff believed that just as every child learns their language without formal

instruction, so can they learn music by a gentle and friendly approach. It is often referred to as a "child-centered way of learning".

The instruments associated with Orff Schulwerk are bells,

chimes, glockenspiels, metallophones, xylophones, and timpani. Orff believed that percussive rhythm instruments like this are the most natural and basic form of human expression. The music played on Orff instruments is often very simple and designed for first-time musicians. The Orff approach also requires children to sing, clap, dance, and snap their fingers along to the melodies and

A Look at the Numbers

It is a privilege to worship, to serve, and to give of ourselves as we share God's Good News with our neighbors and friends. We do that as individuals by the choices we make in everyday life. And we do that together by our work as a congregation. That's what good stewardship is all about.

For that reason, we monitor statistics on attendance and giving to the church. They offer a glimpse into the health of our congregation. During February, 2018, average weekly worship attendance at Holy Trinity (Sunday morning and midweek services) was 183. That's up from an average of 160 per week during February, 2017... an increase of more than 12%. Worship is fundamental to the strength of the community and mission we share. Thanks for making it a priority in your life.

Our year-to-date undesignated giving in support of Holy Trinity's ministry is \$67,127. Our budget target for that same period was \$80,418. We remain behind our year-to-date goal, but have made up some ground this past month as February giving exceeded expectations. Thank you to those who were able to be financially generous. We would ask for your attention to your own giving habits. Please know that we are blessed by your faithful response to God's gifts to you.

Something to consider: More and more folks are moving to electronic giving means, and we have the ability to accommodate that, too. Many find that it is an especially convenient way to manage financial stewardship. Contact Rick Kimble, our financial secretary, for more information about available options and/or to set it up. Please remember: Your tithes and other gifts not only pay the day to day bills here. They extend God's love and grace through our mission work in this area and also well beyond through our partnership with the Northeastern Ohio Synod and the ELCA. There is a ripple effect that quite truly reaches around the world.

Your faithful participation by means of worship, work and support bear witness to the significance of Christ's place in your life. It says to others that what you believe is important enough to affect the way you live. Thank you for being good stewards of the gifts with which God has equipped you. Communion Bread Recipe

Ingredients:

- 1½ cups whole wheat flour
- ½ cup regular white or bread flour
- ¾ teaspoon baking soda
- 3 tablespoons butter (unsalted is best; may substitute margarine)
- 3/4 cup warm water
- 3 tablespoons honey
- 3/4 teaspoon salt

Directions:

 Combine the first four ingredients well. Cut in the butter, and work in thoroughly.

- Combine the water and honey. Stir this into the flour/butter mixture, and combine until you have a sticky dough.
- Turn out onto a board/counter, adding flour until you can knead it. Knead until smooth.
- Divide the flour into four equal parts.
 Roll or press each part into a 6" flat circle.
- Lightly score a cross into the top of each circle. Brush with vegetable oil. Place onto a lightly-greased baking sheet.
- Bake at 350 for no more than 12 minutes. (Over baking makes the bread crumbly.)
- Remove and allow to cool completely.
- When cool it can be bagged for use later in the week or bagged and frozen for use up to three weeks later.
