

We have been celebrating the 150th Anniversary of the formation of Holy Trinity's congregation since June of last year, and what a celebration it has been!




# New Music for a Celebration Year

The 150<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Celebration committee commissioned a new piece of music as part of our festivities. Pr. David was asked to develop the lyrics, which he did as a paraphrase of Psalm 87. The music was composed by Dr. Dennis Friesen-Carper, conductor and composer at Valparaiso University. The result is "A City High on Zion Stands" which will premier as an offering anthem at our closing worship service (9:30 a.m. on Sunday, June 23).

Dr. Friesen-Carper offers these notes on the structure of the composition which draws on musical styles from various significant points in the history of the church...both the Lutheran tradition and Holy Trinity's history:

- ◆ 1517 the beginning of the Lutheran church music in the style of Schutz (1585-1682) famous for introducing antiphonal choirs to Germany, and Praetorius (1571-1621) who was famous for his settings of Lutheran chorales in instrumental styles, often three-voice as this verse is. The handbell accompaniment for the contrapuntal refrain actually harkens back to the fauxbourdon of Dufay (1397-1484).
- ◆ **1868** the founding of Holy Trinity a metrically smooth setting inspired by the *a capella* anthems of John Stainer (1840-1901), though the harmonic language is a bit more current.
- ♦ 1914 the construction of Holy Trinity's current building with its "French gothic" influence music utilizing a French "cantus firmus" style of the early 20th cent., with dramatic organ cadenza.
- ◆ 2018-19 the current 150th celebration combined/united forces with descant in a slightly modal, contemporary, high church style à la Manz, Cherwein, or Rutter.

"Though each verse has its own style, the melody remains relatively stable and perceptible throughout. With the stepwise descending line from the bells recurring somehow in each verse, I hope that the piece feels like an organic unfolding with many internal echoes rather than four disjunct sections. There is also an echo of St. Anne, which calls to mind the Watts paraphrase of Psalm 90...O God, Our Help In Ages Past...a fitting complement to my mind. Its first phrase is nestled into the descant for the refrain, and the whole tune serves as the melodic material for the organ cadenza. I wouldn't want the congregation to spend a lot of energy listening for it, rather for it to occur to them naturally as they focus on Pastor Nevergall's paraphrase of Psalm 87." †



## He Must Increase



Coming up on June 24, the church marks the commemoration of St. John the Baptist... his birthday celebrated exactly six months before Christmas Eve. The reason for the date is linked to the Baptist's own words from John 3:30: "He must increase, but I must decrease." ... a reference to Jesus and the necessity of his emerging ministry as John fades from prominence in the Gospel narrative. No surprise then that we celebrate his birth in these first few days after the summer solstice as the days decrease in length (here in the northern hemisphere)... just as we celebrate Jesus' birth during the darkest days of the year as the days are beginning to grow longer.

The Baptist's words, however, are more than just a convenient way for us to organize the liturgical calendar. They are also a challenge to those who would be witnesses to Jesus in this day and age to humility and true discipleship...an opportunity for honesty about who we are and what we are called to do as God's people in the world.

Case in point: Writing these monthly columns seems to have gotten difficult over the past several months. I sit staring at a blank computer screen for a while... wondering whether or not I have anything of value left to say at this point in my ministry. (After reading this post, you may well conclude that my fears are well founded.)

Yeah...sure. Everybody hits a dry patch once in a while. But this has been deeper and has gone beyond article writing: On one hand, there is the weariness and frustration that comes from preaching/teaching/working towards a goal that seems all too elusive. (The Kingdom of God, in case you hadn't heard, has not yet arrived in all its fullness in Akron.) And on the other hand, there is the hubris...me being convinced that somehow the whole project of being faithful church in this place rests on my shoulders alone. This is foolishness, of course...self-defeating and an absolute dead-end. But it took me re-reading the Baptist's assessment of his own ministry to hear it.

Before I can do what God has called me to do, I must be what God in Christ has made me to be: a dead and broken human being who has been granted a new life, a fresh start, a living hope. Who I am in Christ (a redeemed sinner) overflows into what I am in Christ (grateful, humble, perhaps even ready). And what I am in Christ leads to what I can do with the gifts I have been given. My mistake was trying to run this little bit of logic backwards...trying my best to manufacture my way into humility and thanksgiving. Take it from me: It doesn't work. Christ's ministry to and within me...the goodness and audacity of grace...comes first; and then my response makes sense. "He must increase..."

Having sorted all this out, I'm feeling a bit better about myself and my call to ministry. But somebody keep a copy...because I'll probably forget all too soon, and end up back in the same grumpy and unproductive place. (I have a tendency to do that.) In the meantime, I invite you to examine your own ministry as one of the baptized. Who are you in Christ? What are you in Christ? How is it that Christ must increase in you? And how might that increase set you free to be the person God has intended all along? †

## Thoughts from the Vicar\*

Last week's midweek Bible study encouraged us to reach out to catch people on the bounce. People we meet every day take leaps in life. Sometimes their support system fails and it as if their parachute does not happen. They crash to the ground but the initial hit does not kill them. They are broken and hurting when we meet them, and we may not even know. People who have crashed to the ground and are suffering, need someone who will be there for them. They need someone to catch them before



the next hit brings them to their death.

During the season of Easter, we celebrate the resurrection and see the difference that it makes in the world. We read from the book of Acts and it shows us the beginnings of the church in the first few years after the resurrection. We also read from Revelation which shows us what the church will be when it fully experiences the presence of the risen Christ some day in the future. Many of these accounts that we read speak of healing in the midst of suffering, comfort in sorrow, and peace in times of trial. Through these readings we realize that we are here today because the risen caught us when we were on the bounce. When we were hurting and broken and as good as dead, Christ came to us and lifted us up to life with him. He holds us in his hand and we will never be the same.

As I was writing my final paper of this semester of seminary, I was thinking about how we are transformed by the resurrection of Christ. In one of our earliest Easter readings, Jesus meets hurting people who are walking home from Jerusalem full of sorrow. Jesus does not tell them that they should not grieve. Instead he walks beside them, listened to them, shared his heart and eventually sat down to a meal with them. Their witness to this became a way for them to share the healing and wholeness that they received in that moment with others who were hurting. Their witness of the risen Christ continues to bring hope in our world today.

Have you witnessed the resurrection's transformational power? Has someone reached out to you, walked beside you, and listened to your struggles? How can your witness bring hope and healing to others who are on the bounce? Who will you encounter today that needs to hear the good news of the resurrection that brings life instead of death and healing instead of pain? †

## A Look at the Numbers

It is a privilege to worship, to serve, and to give of ourselves as we share God's Good News with our neighbors and friends. We do that as individuals by the choices we make in everyday life. And we do that together by our work as a congregation. That's what good stewardship is all about. And for that reason, we monitor statistics on attendance and giving to the church. They offer a glimpse into the health of our congregation.

During April, 2019, average weekly worship attendance at Holy Trinity was 242. During April, 2018, our attendance was 199. The monthly difference owes a lot to the timing of our Easter celebration. Year-to-date we are below last year's attendance numbers by about 9%. Please remember: Worship is fundamental to the strength of the community and vital for the mission we share. It is where God blesses us abundantly in the sharing of the Word and Holy Communion. You are missed when you are not here, and you are missing out on God's gifts to you. Thank you for making worship a priority in your life.

For the month of April, unrestricted giving to Holy Trinity totaled \$40,973. That's the second month in a row where giving exceeded our income target. For the year, our income is about 6% below budget. Thank you to all who have made a commitment to financially support our work together. Your gifts are not simply about supporting a budget. They move forward our mission, making a positive impact on the Akron community and beyond.

If you are not a regular contributor, we invite you to take up that challenge. Choosing to give every week (or even every month) as you are able helps establish a good habit. Even more: it becomes a regular reminder of God's goodness and generosity, and offers a tangible way to give thanks for that goodness.

Something to consider: More and more folks are moving to electronic giving means, and we have the ability to accommodate that, too. Many find that it is an especially convenient way to manage financial stewardship. Contact Rick Kimble, our financial secretary, for more information about available options and/or to set it up.

Your faithful participation by means of worship, work and support bear witness to the significance of Christ's place in your life. It says to others that what you believe is important enough to affect the way you live. **Thank you** for being good stewards of the gifts with which God has equipped you. And remember to join us...this and every week... as the work of Christ's Church goes on. †







## **Communion Bread Recipe**

#### **Ingredients:**

- 1½ cups whole wheat flour
- ½ cup regular white or bread flour
- ¾ teaspoon baking soda
- 3 tablespoons butter (unsalted is best; may substitute margarine)
- 3/4 cup warm water
- 3 tablespoons honey
- 3/4 teaspoon salt

#### **Directions:**

 Combine the first four ingredients well. Cut in the butter, and work in thoroughly.

- Combine the water and honey. Stir this into the flour/butter mixture, and combine until you have a sticky dough.
- Turn out onto a board/counter, adding flour until you can knead it. Knead until smooth
- Divide the flour into four equal parts. Roll or press each part into a 6" flat circle.
- Lightly score a cross into the top of each circle. Brush with vegetable oil. Place onto a lightly-greased baking sheet.
- Bake at 350 for no more than 12 minutes. (Over baking makes the bread crumbly.)
- Remove and allow to cool completely.
- When cool it can be bagged for use later in the week or bagged and frozen for use up to three weeks later.



## There are Many Opportunities for YOU to Serve!

#### Serve as an Evening Host—7-9 p.m.

You watch over areas of the church that are being used and sometimes interact with the families by doing crafts, watching movies, etc. You can be upstairs on the 3rd floor with the families or remain in Room 202.

#### Serve as an Afternoon Driver - 5-6 p.m.

You drive a Family Promise van from the church to Family Promise to pick up the families and return to the church. *NOTE: As a driver, you are covered under Family Promise's insurance.* 

#### Serve as a Grocery Shopper—anytime

You purchase groceries in advance so there is food for the families to eat when they arrive. You will be given a list; the items can be placed in Room 202. You can turn in the receipt for reimbursement or donate the items you purchased.

Also, there are opportunities for you to help in other ways ... help set-up the beds and rooms before the families arrive ... help remove the beds and load them into the van so they can be transported to the next church ... help launder the bedding ... serve as an overnight host (you actually spend the night at the church; beds are provided). †
